Motivation

The construction industry is responsible for a substantial part of the global CO2 emissions, and the sector's traditional technical solutions are not sufficient to reduce emissions to the level set by the UN sustainability goals. At the same time, expanding and maintaining the built environment worldwide is crucial for achieving balanced living conditions, which is essential for the development of a socially sustainable global society. This presents a dilemma between environmental and social sustainability and calls for fundamental changes in the way the construction industry design, construct and maintain buildings and the civil infrastructure. At Tivoli Congress Center, designed by Kim Utzon Architects, the impressive Tivoli Congress Hall offers capacity for up to 2,500 participants at one event, but it is also ideal for exhibitions or trade show activities. An additional 23 meeting facilities and two auditoriums of varying sizes can be combined in countless ways to meet every requirement for events of up to 4,000 people, and our impressive foyer makes the perfect setting for your exhibition, fashion show or reception.

Tivoli Congress Center is located under the same roof as Tivoli Hotel and offers 679 hotel rooms and suites, two restaurants, fitness centre and a large swimming pool. Additional accommodation is available at the next door hotel Wakeup Copenhagen The location in the heart of Copenhagen offers you direct access to shopping, amusements, museums, world-famous architecture and surrounding nature with minimal transportation time.

How to get to the Venue

The congress center is located in the city centre. You can take the train direct from Copenhagen Airport $\cup{4}$ Terminal 3 on track 2 to Copenhagen. Get off at Copenhagen Central Station and walk to the hotel, which is within 8-10 minutes walking distance.

You can also get a train on tracks 11 and 12 at Central Station that will take you to Dybbølsbro Station. Tickets from the airport to Copenhagen Central Station are also valid on the bus, metro and S-train. Total travel time is approx. 25 minutes. Tickets valid for all public transport can be bought in the airport Terminal 3 or from machines at the metro station. You need a 3 zone ticket per trip from/to the airport. Taking a taxi from the airport will cost approx. DKK 280. All taxis are metered and accept all major international credit cards.

General Information



Local Transportation

The Metro train from Copenhagen Airport offers you a direct train every 4-6 minutes to the city centre of Copenhagen and will take approximately 14 minutes. Please check www.m.dk and www.rejseplanen.dk for further information.

Banks

Normal banking hours are from 10:00 to 16:00 hrs. Monday to Friday. On Thursday banking hours are extended to 18:00 hrs. Extended banking facilities are available at Copenhagen Central Railway Station 7 days/week between

07:00 and 21:00 hrs.

There are ATMs usually located in connection with a bank branch, which accept a variety of international credit cards. The cards accepted are indicated on the dispenser.



Currency and money exchange



The currency in Denmark is Danish Kroner (DKK). 1 Euro is approx. 7,45 DKK and 1 USD is approx. 6,68 DKK as per August 2024.

Most shops and restaurants accept Euro, but at a higher rate. Credit cards are widely accepted – also in taxis.

Tips are always included in the prices given in taxis and restaurants in Denmark. Tipping is not expected but appreciated.

Letter of Invitation

The congress organisation will be pleased to send a formal letter of invitation to delegates requesting an invitation letter for visa purposes.

It is understood that such an invitation is intended to help potential delegates to raise funds or to obtain a visa. This does not imply a commitment from the congress organisers to provide any financial support. For more information, please contact DIS Congress Service.

Passport and visa

The entry formalities for the Kingdom of Denmark vary according to the country of origin. There are no visa requirements for EU passport holders.

Other congress delegates are asked to address enquiries about entry and vaccination requirements to the travel agent or to the local Danish Embassy / Consulate / Representation in the home country.

All foreign citizens must be the holder of a valid passport.




ACCOMMODATION

Tivoli Hotel is only 15 minutes' walk from the popular Tivoli Gardens and the city centre of Copenhagen with its many attractions. The hotel's 679 rooms have air-conditioning, satellite TV and free wireless internet. The décor in some of the rooms is inspired by themes from the historic Tivoli Gardens. The 12th-floor Sky Bar (Sticks 'n' Sushi) offers city and waterfront views. Facilities include Tivoli Brasserie, MASH Penthouse Restaurant, a special children's area and a gym. The Tivoli Hotel & Congress Center is designed by Danish architect Kim Utzon. Parking facilities available for a fee.

This modern hotel offers good-value accommodation in Copenhagen, only 15 minutes' walk from attractions such as the Tivoli Gardens and the shopping street, Strøget. The 510 rooms at Wakeup Copenhagen have airconditioning, flatscreen TV, a small work desk and bathroom with shower. Please note that all rooms have one 160 cm wide double bed (no twin beds) and are non-smoking. The 13-floor building is designed by Danish architect Kim Utzon. Facilities include a large breakfast restaurant, business centre, free WiFi and parking for a fee.

CABINN Copenhagen Hotel was built in 2019 and is centrally located close to the harbour front and the hip MeatpackingDistrict. All 1202 rooms have a private bathroom, TV, free WiFi and a kettle including free tea and coffee. The hotel has a breakfast restaurant and a lift to all floors, including the underground car park (fees apply). Smoking is not allowed in all indoor areas.
